Our key social action activities include Schools Plus, LinkAges, Youth Theatre, Woolly Matters, Give It A Go, the Social Impact Internship Scheme, and the Try It Awards.

Schools Plus

Schools Plus is our largest practical volunteering programme aimed at tackling educational disadvantage in and around Winchester. This year we worked with primary and secondary schools, and libraries based in Winchester and Basingstoke. Though we had a tricky start to the year, with the support of our advisory board, the hard work of our student coordinator, Jess, and our Projects Officer, Daniel, Schools Plus grew attracting a variety of students. We had 43 student volunteers supporting 12 community projects.

In the second semester, we piloted a project working in Maple Ridge Primary School in Basingstoke, and were also contacted by Fair Oak Junior School in Eastleigh. We are very excited to be expanding Schools Plus in the 2018/19 academic year.

Youth Theatre

Youth Theatre, our student-led drama club, continued to run sessions at the Carroll Centre this year. We ran sessions during their after-school club in an effort to reach more children. We also worked alongside Winnall Primary School to develop some new workshops, including a choir session, and are currently looking for more community spaces to run these in the new academic year.

LinkAges

LinkAges is our intergenerational volunteering programme that aims to lessen the effects of elderly isolation through activities that bridge the gap and faciliate interactions between students and older people.

This year we have continued to work with Winchester City Council and TACT to host befriending opportunities at Hyde Gate Sheltered Housing. We have also started supporting activities at St Cross Grange Care Home and Sunrise of Winchester in Weeke. In total, we have had 28 volunteers in four community projects throughout the year.

Kyra-Jaine, a second year education student, goes to Hyde Gate for tea every Tuesday...

"I go down to have tea, I bake cake sometimes, I take cakes down and they like that. Carol gave me a quiche dish she won in the raffle. So I brought her a quiche so she could see it was being used! So I just go down and have tea, chat. [We] mostly [talk about] gardening, I had no idea about gardening, Ernie tries to teach me but...I have no idea.

Some of [the residents] really like having someone to talk to, especially those who can't get out, so it's nice for them to go somewhere, have a chat have a cup of tea. I enjoy it, it's my favourite time of the week!

I would say I'm more confident, especially around older people, whereas before I would think if they were old they would think I was young and stupid! Whereas now if I see an older person in the street I always smile."

Give It A Go and Student Volunteering Week

We had 101 students taking part in one-off activities throughout the year, supporting projects such as wildflower planting on campus, Christmas Postcards at Royal Hampshire County Hospital, and a clothes drive. The jewel of the year was Student Volunteering Week! The student committee organised an event for every day of the week. These events attracted over 100 students to volunteering opportunities, stalls, and other smaller activities.

Community Action Day

Our annual community action day took place in Cromwell Park in Stanmore, in collaboration with the Students Union, Winchester City Council, and Osbourne. Though it was a blustery day, there was fantastic turn out from both students living locally to Cromwell Park and local residents.



LinkAges Tea Party



We hosted a LinkAges Tea Party at West Downs where we invited guests from sheltered housing estates in town (that we work with weekly through LinkAges) to campus. 32 volunteers helped host and entertain guests with a quiz and lots of cake!

Hedgehog Habitat Building

We worked with the Environment and Maintenance teams at the University to deliver a hedgehog habitat building session. Students here had the opportunity to learn about hedgehog populations and how to safely use power tools to create large homes for hedgehog which have now been placed around campus, protecting our unique wildlife.

Social Impact Internship Scheme

This year we took 9 students onto the internship scheme. We were very impressed by the quality of candidates this year, and the organisations they've gone on to work in, including; Winchester Hospice, FirstBite CIC, BrendonCare, and Catering at the University of

Winchester.



The Charity Challenge

This year The Charity Challenge took place with a focus on supporting Trinity. Fundraisers from Trinity came and delivered briefs for our teams to work on. The teams designed ways to support service users, develop Trinity's construction work, and reach new audiences to fundraise through.



The Try It Awards

We ran two rounds of the Try It Awards this year, alongside a range of workshops tailored at supporting students who had never thought of setting up a social enterprise before. Some of the award winners this year include Messy Play Theatre and The Bard Buskers, who can often be found performing on the High Street!





A core part of engagement at Winchester Hub is about supporting and challenging students to feel comfortable and confident taking the lead, either formally through our leadership roles, or informally in their day-to-day interactions. This is a key part in developing active citizens, and encouraging them to embed these behaviours for life.

Our student committee have led on 16 events this year, and have been featured in the local newspaper three times, including Jess Booth, our Schools Plus coordinator receiving the Mayor's Community Award, recognising the impact Schools Plus has on the community.

I worked closely with one of the graduate support officers, where I was able to speak about my experience with Hub and how this relates to the world of work, my career options, my interests, skills I wanted to develop and so forth. This coupled with the President role has been a particularly effective way to ease myself into what I choose to do post-academia."





This year has been interesting and exciting, though facing some difficulties in various areas, we have managed to grow several of our volunteering programmes; for the first time, we have placed over 100 students in long-term volunteering placements! We have also had the opportunity to pilot new projects. We have new school partners for Schools Plus, new extra care facilities for LinkAges, and have begun discussions with more community spaces about how we can reach even more people in Winchester.

We have a new, full committee, with many students entering their second year and stepping into leadership roles for the first time. We plan on supporting them with assigned personal development champions and almuni mentors who will help guide them through social action outside the university setting.

I'm thrilled to be joining Winchester Hub this year to gain first hand experience in volunteering and working with a new team of excited new students, and to watch how we and the surrounding community can grow together!
